HCSM is designed to mitigate student musicians' increased risk for Noise-Induced Hearing Loss while presenting learning opportunities for students in the School of Rehabilitation and Communication Sciences.







Who: Children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and their sibling between the ages of 5-11 years (6 sibling pairs).

What: Joint sibling social skills intervention using Comic Strip Conversations (CSCs; Gray, 1994), personalized iPad stories, and a cooperative game.

Research Question: What are the perceptions of caregivers and children on a CSC intervention involving siblings as co-recipients?

- 1 training session and 3 intervention sessions.
- Siblings worked with the primary investigator to create CSCs based on a social scenario. Prompts to discuss dialogue, thoughts, and feelings were provided.
- Siblings took on roles of CSC characters to "act out" the story to create personalized iPad story.
- Siblings played a cooperative game.

The Intervention



- Caregivers completed a satisfaction questionnaire.
- Caregivers were interviewed- asked about strengths and challenges of involving siblings in intervention.
- Each child was interviewed regarding- likes and dislikes of intervention, what they learned, how they felt about working with their sibling, and if they would want to work with their sibling again.

The Interviews



Caregivers

- Average satisfaction 4.67-5.00 (5 being the highest rating).
- Strengths
- · Collaboration opportunities
- Children are confident & comfortable with their sibling
- · Challenges
- · Sibling without ASD taking control
- · Siblings distracting one another

Children

- Children liked the game and intervention activities. Expressed desire for shorter sessions and different types of activities.
- Learned a skill/lesson (e.g., solving a problem) and CSC symbols/conventions.
- Feelings about working with sibling-7 positive feelings, 3 negative, 2 ambivalent
- 6/12 children would work with their sibling on future projects

- Characterized by muscle weaknesses (respiratory and oral-facial muscles)









Aging and Gerontological Education Society


